FLOURS FOR ALL REASONS



Having been a keen cook for many years, I have learnt that the flour one uses makes an enormous difference to the end results, writes Pauline Brown. So, when we decided to add flour to the range in our food hall we did some investigation to find the best quality flour in our local area. Having tried a few, I came to the personal opinion that the flours produced by F. W. P Matthews (based in Shipton-under-Wychwood, Chipping Norton) were of excellent quality. We started with a small range and, as anticipated, they proved to be so popular that we now stock eleven different varieties: Plain, Self-Raising, Strong White, Strong Wholemeal, Cotswold Crunch, Cotswold Eight Grain, Maizebite, Wholemeal Spelt, Pizza Flour, French T55 and Dark Rye.

Here is a brief introduction to four of the flours we stock and opposite a guide to the all of the flours we sell.

Cotswold Crunch, our most popular flour, makes the most delicious bread so easily, whether you have a bread maker or, with a little more time and effort, take a more traditional approach. It is excellent just by itself but, as a small twist to change the flavour slightly, I use about one sixth Dark Rye to five sixths Cotswold Crunch. This flour also makes a wonderful, crunchy crumble.

I was always a little disappointed with the pastry I cooked until I tried Maizebite and since then I use nothing else to get consistently crisp, crunchy pastry. Perfect for either sweet or savoury, either done by hand or in the food processor.

I had never particularly considered making my own pizza dough. Instead being lazy and buying ready-made bases, but not anymore. Using Matthews' Pizza Flour is quick and easy, making soft but crispy bases to add any desired topping to.

Then finally, French T55. If you are a fan of soft white bread this is a great flour to use. Also for baguette lovers, it produces these with a fine, airy and soft texture with an appetising, crispy crust. If you are interested in learning more about F. W. P Matthews their website gives lots of information on the history of the business (dating back to the 1800s), recipes and descriptions of the rest of the range. www.fwpmatthews.co.uk

Just one further thought, for those who enjoy the home-made scones in our restaurant, these are made using Matthews' flour – maybe that's why they are so delicious!

TIPS ON GROWING YOUR BEST EVER POTATOES

One of the greatest joys in gardening, whether you are a new or experienced gardener is growing a few spuds and harvesting them in early summer. We would always recommend starting off with certified Scottish seed potatoes as they are screened for disease so you have the best chance for a disease-free crop. Potatoes, as brassicas, are a perfect crop for opening up and improving the soil of a new garden or where the soil is heavy. You don't even need a garden to grow potatoes as you can get a reasonable crop from potatoes grown in pots!

FIRST EARLY VARIETIES

- Plant Easter onwards
- Harvest mid June

SECOND EARLY VARIETIES

- Plant Easter onwards
- Harvest early July

CHITTING is a very simple process but important process. All you need is some egg cartons or boxes to stand the potatoes in. Place the end with the most eyes (the growing tip) facing up! Now choose a bright, warm, frost free spot and wait for 3-4 weeks for the sprouts to emerge. You can do this in a conservatory or window sill or a bright garage. Avoid dark places or will get very long, thin and leggy shoots that are very fragile.





"Tip: Short of space? Grow potatoes in pots too!"

Once the weather has warmed up a bit you are all ready to go! Plant them carefully without breaking the shoots. Of course, the shoots have to face up when you plant them. Chitting is vital for earlies and useful for main crop. Check out our fantastic range of over 50 varieties of seed potatoes, available either as pre-packs or loose in the shop on your next visit.

STARTING OFF YOUR BEANS

February is traditionally the time to start thinking about starting off early crops such as Broad Beans for planting out later in the vegetable garden. You can also make a head start with tuberous begonias in warmth on a sunny windowsill indoors.



Having soaked your Broad Bean seeds in water for half an hour sow a single seed per cell in your propagating tray using a multipurpose compost or why not recycle your cardboard loo rolls for seed sowing.




GROWING TIP: Grow Nasturtiums near your Broad Beans to keep your aphids away.

PLANTING YOUR BEGONIA TUBERS

It's always exciting to start off begonia tubers, however before you rush in and plant, please bear in mind the tuber has a top and bottom. The concave (indentation) is where the new growing shoots will develop from so this is the top of the tuber. The rounded 'base' is where the roots will form so this needs to be facing down into the compost. See photo below.





When you comes to selecting varieties some will be marked basket types - trailing foliage and cascading blooms so these are perfect for hanging baskets or windowboxes. The other form of tuberous begonias are referred to as upright varieties, these are ideal as centre plants in pots and in borders with their bushy upright habit of growth. You can start off your tubers into either seed trays or into individual pots containing a multi-purpose compost. Grow your begonias in a well-lit, frost-free greenhouse or on a windowsill.

BEGONIA CARE Begonias are sensitive to bright sunlight and need protection from intense heat. They grow best in filtered

light beneath trees, or in an area that gets about four hours of morning or afternoon sunlight but not mid-day. After planting, do not water until the first sprouts emerge after 2-3 weeks. Over watering before you see leaves may cause the tuber to rot. Plant the begonias outdoors when all danger of frost has passed. Water the plants regularly to keep the potting soil slightly moist. Provide a high potash fertilizer such as Tomorite or Phostrogen fortnightly during the growing season. Be sure to provide plenty of air circulation to prevent powdery mildew. Use a sharp knife or florists's scissors to cut spent blooms as soon as they fade.

PLANT OF THE MONTH

In February we have the wonderfully starry flowered *Magnolia stellata*. These are usually priced at £34.99 each but available to our Garden Card holders for just £19.99 each. All our offers are subject to availability. This Magnolia is a really useful garden shrub that delights every spring with its delicate white blooms opening before the leaves.

In March, Hebe 'Merlot Memories' (PBR) takes centre stage as our Plant of the Month. The sensational winter foliage colour of deep reddish brown becomes bright green as weather warms. An ideal backdrop to the masses of white tinted purple flowers in summer. They are normally £10.99 each, however, they are available to our Garden Card holders for just £7.99.





Now is the time to re-vamp and energise your containers with some early spring bulb colour with Crocus, Winter Aconite, Narcissus 'Tête-à-Tête', Fritillaria or Tulips amongst others. We have these in 9cm pots (£2.49 each or 3 for £6.00) as well as larger 1-litre pots (£3.99 each or 2 for £7.00) while stocks last. Specialist snowdrops including Elwesii, 'Flore Pleno' and Ikariae are £3.99 in 9cm pots. The common snowdrop, Galanthus nivalis in a 9cm pot is £2.49 and in a larger 1-litre pot is £5.99 each.

As you know we love Hellebores at the Garden Centre and when we heard of a new cross called Frostkiss ® we had to have some. Wow, we've been blown away with the colour range. By crossbreeding several types the breeder, Rodney Davey, has produced a super strong, frost-resistant hellebore with colourful flowers and magnificent foliage. Varieties to look out for include 'Charmer' (huge dark pink flowers with burgundy flecking in the centre), 'Cheryl's Shine' (glowing light pink flowers), Pippa's Purple' (smokey pink flowers with some deep burgundy speckles), 'Sally's Shell' (medium pink with a soft shell-pink centre) and 'Molly's White' (clear white) amongst others. 2-litre pots priced at £13.99 each from Devon.
