In our ever changing world of fast moving technology and day-to-day life, it's particularly good to see and read that gardening continues to get the thumbs up as a way of helping us to relieve everyday stress and help stimulate the senses.

In a recent report it was also highlighted that the garden can and often does double up as one of the best outdoor gyms! Routine gardening tasks such as regular pruning and lopping can shed around 238 calories every 60 minutes! Digging also fairs well - 272 calories per hour, although I know which activity I would prefer!

Getting out and about in the garden and on the allotment also appears to be good for our mental well-being according to another recent study. The study, by Westminster and Essex Universities, questioned 269 people - around half of whom did some gardening. The results revealed that those who spent as little as 30 minutes a week on their allotments saw significant gains in mental well-being, according to the Journal of Public Health. The research also showed the allotment gardeners had fewer weight problems. Those who had worked on their allotments at least once a week had lower levels of fatigue, depression, tension and anger and had higher self-esteem and better general health than those who had done no gardening at all! So, on that

cheery note Christmas lunch won't feel such a guilty pleasure this year! Another mince pie, anyone?

THE BIG RASPBERRY PRUNING QUESTION ANSWERED

Of all the fruit questions we get asked, it is raspberry pruning that receives the most requests for advice and explanations. We have recently updated the advice we are giving with plants we send out, so we thought it might be useful to share the information with our Garden Centre Club Members too!

Bare-rooted raspberries need to be pruned hard back to 2in (5cm) above soil level after planting. This helps to stimulate the root system and encourages new canes (shoots) to develop below the soil and stimulates growth in the spring. Raspberries need a moist but free-draining neutral to acid soil. If your soil is particularly heavy, you can plant them on a ridge to assist drainage. Improve the soil by working in some horticultural grit if necessary. Watering is essential in dry spells after planting. Make sure you work plenty of organic matter into the soil and around the roots



such as well-rotted manure or Tree, Shrub & Rose Planting Compost, bonemeal and some rootgrow to help establish the roots. To help protect the shallow roots and maintain moisture mulch the soil after planting. Finally, don't plant your raspberry canes too deeply. Use the existing soil mark on the stem as a guide for depth.

LOVE YOUR CHICKENS THIS WINTER



Winter can be a challenge for any animal so a little extra care will go a long way, says Mick Collins. Right now is the time to give your flocks health a good check over. You should now be giving them a worming treatment, which can be supplied by your vet. Giving them some garlic granules or Vermex in their diet is a good start for their digestive system. It would be worth adding some vitamin drops to supplement their diet as well just to make them a bit perkier. Don't forget to suspend a cabbage in the run to help keep the

chickens occupied as well as giving them some essential greens as well.

The chickens will spend longer in their roost, and who can blame them, so keep up a rigorous mucking out routine at least once a week! It is also important to continue treating the chickens and the coop for Red Mite and Lice, which can still be a problem even in the winter. A sprinkling of disinfectant powder before you put in the fresh bedding will not only act as a sanitizer, but will help keep unwanted smells away.

A top tip is to take in the drinkers at night if it's going to freeze. This will save a lot of hassle in the morning. During particularly cold spells check their water during the day as well, as a good supply of drinking water is essential. Give them a handful of corn or scratch feed (such as Mixed Corn) an hour before bedtime to help keep up those energy levels as this should help to maintain warmth. They may not lay so many eggs during cold spells but a little extra effort is well worth it for their well being and for your peace of mind.

LOOKING TO THE CLOUDS FOR A SKY GARDEN!

Trevor Bradley, from our I. T. Department, goes in search of a tropical skyward adventure in the City of London.

20 Fenchurch Street is actually in Central London, a short walk from The Tower. It is an imposing 160m (525ft) skyscraper, the fifth highest skyscraper in London. But you are probably wondering where the garden is that I am visiting? Courtyard garden? Outside landscaping? None of these. In fact the garden is called The Sky Garden and its name gives away where this garden is. It is right at the very top of the skyscraper, 37 floors up.

You can't miss 20 Fenchurch Street. From pretty much anywhere in Central London you can see the building on the skyline. It is affectionately known as the 'Walkie Talkie' because of its shape, thinner at the bottom than the top. It does provide an interesting architectural addition to the London landscape alongside the likes



of 'The Shard', 'The Cheesegrater', 'The Gherkin' and 'The London Eye'. Approaching the building, you realise just how tall the building is.

But I wasn't here to admire the architecture; I was here for the Sky Garden. The Sky



Garden has its own entrance and to gain admittance this is via a pre-booked, timed ticket, but there was still a small queue though. This is because there are high security checks before the staff let you through to the lift area – you are checked using the same security used at airports. You walk through metal detectors and your bags are checked through an x-ray machine. Standing, waiting for the lift, there is a little air of anticipation with your fellow visitors about to join you on the ascent to the summit. We enter the lift, the doors close. Are we moving? 15 seconds later the doors open and we have

been whisked 37 floors to the top of 20 Fenchurch Street!

The first thing that hits you as you walk out of the lift area is the space. It is so spacious and very light and airy. This feeling is created because the whole of the top of the Sky Garden is glass. It creates one massive greenhouse effect. But that is the way it has to be because the planting here is that of a tropical greenhouse. The planted gardens themselves are either side of a central restaurant with staircases either side taking you up to the very top level. The gardens are created utilising slopes and terraces. There are constant misters providing water and humidity to the plants. Cleverly, the designers of the garden have created three separate areas on the slopes. At the top (which surprisingly receives the least amount of light), there are shade-loving forest plants; in the middle, there is a transition zone down to flowering plants at the bottom. The plants are from around the World - shrubs, succulents, trees, ferns, groundcover and climbers.





The low levels of light in the shady area were filled with a great mix of plants. Cythea medullaris, the New Zealand tree fern, was utilised. The fern can grow to 20 metres in height and is very fast growing - 15cm per year. As very few plants are now exported from New Zealand, the ones planted in the Sky Garden are some of the very tallest in Europe and so made a very special sight. Through the centre of the garden, in the transition zone, there are plants such as 22 Cycas circinalis. The literature says these are each over 100 years old! There are also 6 large Cycas revolute and also Cycas Samia furfuracea (Cardboard Plant). The bottom area is reserved for pure colour being close to the café area of the Sky Garden. The planting here included Watsonia, a gladioli relative. The planting scheme has been created to give all round year colour whether from the green of the evergreens

or the vivid colour of the temperate plants. The list of plants is huge and too large to reproduce here.

The Sky Garden is not only all about the garden though. Walk out onto the huge outdoor terrace and you have spectacular panoramic views of London. You will not find better views of London than you get from here, so long as you have a good head for heights! And before you leave and descend the lift back down to 'terra firma', have a hot drink and a sandwich from the food bar. Or if you feel like really treating yourself, there is a fully stocked cocktail bar. I was surprised just how cheap it was to stay and have my lunch there. And, if you are lucky as I was, you might even get a jazz band playing on the terrace to accompany it.

So, as you descend in the lift, your time at the Sky Garden is over. Well not quite. Make sure as you leave to check out the spectacular vertical garden, a version of which we also have here at the Garden Centre through the summer months.

Finally, there is one other thing worth mentioning. Something that may surprise you. You probably are wondering just how much this experience costs. London attractions

are very expensive. For example, to view from the top of The Shard (a similar height and not a plant in sight!) costs £25.95. So what does the Sky Garden cost? Nothing! Yes, believe it or not, the whole experience is FREE! Now if that isn't value for money for an attraction in London then I don't know what is. All you have to do is make sure you book your tickets in advance here: https://skygardentickets.com. I hope, if this persuades you to visit the Sky Garden, that you enjoy your visit as much as I did.

TOP TASKS FOR LATE NOVEMBER / DECEMBER

EDIBLES Sowings can be made outdoors of Broad Bean 'Aquadulce Claudia' (pictured) and the variety the 'Sutton' can also be sown now but must be given the protection of cloches. Continue planting suitable varieties of Garlic such as 'Solent Wight' until late November. For a continuous supply of Lettuce crops during winter plant varieties, such as 'Vaila' and 'Winter Gem', in containers, borders or cropping bags and grow on in a warm greenhouse. Protect outside crops with



either Envirofleece, which is very popular with vegetable growers, or Enviromesh which acts as a barrier to garden pests as well as providing some frost protection.

CHRISTMAS wouldn't be Christmas without a lovely red Poinsettia (pictured). It is



essential you position the plant in good light away from direct sunlight and draughts. Avoid temperatures below 55°F (13°C). Overwatering too, quickly damages the plant. When the surface of the compost begins to dry out, water thoroughly. Place the pot on a pebble tray, as a humid atmosphere will prolong the bract life. The process to encourage new bracts can be complicated so ask in the Plant Info Office if you need the details. However, successfully re-bracting a plant is something you should have a go at and if you

do succeed you can say you've cracked it!

POND TIPS If the surface of water features or a pond has frozen solid, and particularly if it contains fish, melt the ice with care. Keeping an area of the pond free of ice allows toxic gases to escape – ensuring the pond can breathe and function correctly. If the pond is stocked with fish and it does freeze over, melt the ice by placing a pan of hot water on the surface, or install a pond heater such as the Aquael Floating Pond Heater. This 300 watt



floating pond heater is robustly made from stainless steel with an expanded foam float and comes complete with a 10-metre cable. The heater is available in our Aquatic Department. Floating a ball on the water in cold weather can also delay freezing. However, never smash the ice, as the shock waves can harm fish. It is worth checking to see if any unwanted leaf debris, twigs and other material has been blown into the water and if necessary fish it out! If you are in a rural location do keep a wary eye out for unwanted visitors such as herons and cats.

ORNAMENTALS Taller growing bush roses can be pruned down by about half which will



prevent the wind from causing them to become loose through swaying and in turn damaging the roots. The branches of standard roses should also be shortened. Our new range of root-wrapped rose bushes can be planted this month as well as bare-rooted hedging roses such as Rosa rugosa, 'Roseraie de L'Hay' (pictured) and 'Hansa'. There are plenty of interesting seasonal plants around including berried beauties such as Hollies (Ilex) and Pyracantha. Good evergreens, for example Camellias, Hellebores (including the Christmas Rose) and versatile Hedera (Ivy), are

perfect to make useful displays as well as lovely gift idea too!

APPLE & HONEY WEEKEND REVIEW

A big 'Thank You' to everyone who attended our Apple & Honey Show Weekend. The sun shone and we had a great crowd eager to get their mystery apple fruits identified. Gerry Edwards, our top RHS Fruit expert, aka apple 'Sherlock Holmes' said it had been a very busy weekend, in fact possibly more than when he was asked to put names to fruit for the RHS, no less. Gerry identified over 50 varieties over the two days.





Fruit growing advice was in great demand again with Moulton College's Fritz De Zutter answering a high volume of questions, mostly relating to best growing practises as well as rootstock advice.

Claire from The Mid-Shires Orchard Group was kept extremely busy demonstrating the process of preparing the apples and making fine tasting apple

juice as well as providing tasty samples to all our customers (and staff) throughout the weekend.





Our other guests over the weekend included the Great Horwood-based Medical Detection Dogs Charity, Tim Chafor (pictured left) from Chafor Wine Estates in Gawcott, Cottage Delight providing some tasty treats, the local Buckingham Beekeepers and children's entertainers magician Phil Banks and Lin, face painting artiste.



Root-wrapped roses are now available for collection, click and collect and on-line. The quality of the plants is superb again this year and we have a really good range of varieties covering bush, climbers and ramblers, including the 2016 Rose of the Year 'Sunny Sky' (pictured left). This striking Hybrid Tea produces large yellow flowers which have a fruity fragrance.
